FROM THE HEADMASTER

I had rather hoped that the strange circumstances pertaining at the time I penned my previous OKA Magazine introduction would have long since dissipated twelve months later. Sadly not; January 2022 has proved a Covid-lite version of January 2021. However, there is a great deal more optimism on the ground this time around. School is operating at close to 'normal', if one ignores the omnipresent face masks (which renders classroom Q&A sessions difficult, unless one has acute hearing!). The Senior School did take a mild pummelling at the fag end of the Summer Term, as most of our Lower 6th were 'pinged' off the premises and the Ball had to be cancelled; replaced with an U6th Leavers' meal, speeches and disco in early September, post A-Level results. The Prep School suffered a number of waves of pupil absence in the Autumn. However, by and large, we escaped pretty unscathed and the average pupil absence has never exceeded 2% of the Senior School population.



That 'population' did not contract as a result of the economic ravages of the pandemic. The 2021 Autumn Term began with a record number of pupils in the school – now nudging the 1100 mark. Whilst any longer term School Development Plans were inevitably put on ice for the duration, the Governors are looking forward to publishing a new Strategic Review during the course of this year, to which, undoubtedly, alumni relations will form a part.

Whilst no major construction projects have taken place, the campus has been spruced up in a number of areas – not least with the completion of a new Outdoor Pursuits compound, a brand new set of changing rooms alongside the Duchess all weather pitch and, most notably, a grand new entrance to the Prep School. Long overdue, it brings an impressive sense of light as you enter the building and you can see straight through to the playing fields beyond; a softening of the otherwise somewhat austere redbrick Victorian façade.

Sadly, the year provided thin gruel for OK events. However, the OK football team are progressing well in the Arthurian League, under the tutelage of the spritely captain, George Wilson and, equally spritely, Manager Jon 'Pep' Hunter. Simon Doyle (Captain of football 1982) and I have watched a number of games together from the side lines, convincing each other that we could both still 'do a job' in the middle of the park. Actually true in Simon's case, as he donned his shorts during a November injury crisis.

Last year saw the retirement of a number of Kimbolton stalwarts with Messrs Bamford and Bates departing after a combined 67 years' service to the School. Indeed, I imagine some of those pupils whom AJB first taught in 1984 are, themselves, pondering retirement themselves now. Kimbolton School owes a huge debt to both teachers and it was disappointing that pandemic restrictions prevented us giving both of them the rousing send-off which they fully deserved.

Other notable departees were Edward Valletta, Bursar for 22 years and responsible for overseeing a plethora of building projects over the past two decades and, of course, our own OK Alumni Officer, Helen Hopperton. Helen will be greatly missed, both for her encyclopaedic knowledge of the OK 'network' and the calm assurance with which she took on this new role a decade ago, and then ran with it so successfully. I am delighted that her successor, Vicky Wakefield, is also an OK.

A warm welcome too to Sarah Gill who took over the OK Presidency in the Summer – the first President to be a pupil during my tenure at Kimbolton. James Brown's term as President came to a frustrating close as all his excellent ideas on taking the OKA forward were wrecked on the rocks of Covid. I very much enjoyed working with James and he has prised open initiatives through which Sarah's presidential ambitions can flow.

I look forward to seeing many of you over the course of the year, as we emerge blinking from our enforced 'hibernation' over the coming months. In particular, I hope that the OK weekend in July will prove a rumbustious occasion as we celebrate three years' worth of leaving anniversaries. I trust that the sun will shine on the righteous and old friendships can be renewed after such a lengthy hiatus.

A further thanks must also be given to all the footballers who give up their Saturdays to represent us so well. I am really looking forward to leading the committee into the next few years and I am hopeful we can move forward without any further restrictions. LARA NAMED AS #SHEPADDLES AMBASSADOR

Fourth Form paddlesports enthusiast Lara has been named by British Canoeing, Canoe Wales and the Scottish Canoe Association as one of 16 inspirational #ShePaddles Ambassadors for 2021. The talented 14-year-old first took to the water aged six, learning and developing her skills with Wansford-based KEW paddlers. She now fits white-water kayaking and sea kayaking around GCSE studies and U15B Hockey matches, naming Llagollen in Wales and, more locally, the River Nene as her favourite places to explore.

In her spare time Lara enjoys helping teach younger children at the Leam Boat Centre, and recently chose kayaking as part of her Bronze Duke of Edinburgh award. This involved taking a British Canoeing Foundation Safety and Rescue Training course, which is an early step towards becoming a qualified coach. She also has her sights set on one day completing the 125-mile Devizes to Westminster canoe race — in which Kimbolton has an enviable track record.

She says: "I'm super excited to be a #ShePaddles Ambassador and am looking forward to working with British Canoeing over the next 12 months. I want to encourage more young women and girls to take up the sport, and hope my experiences will inspire others to get involved."

Twelve Kimbolton pupils competed against 36 other teams at the annual Cheadle Hulme Model United Nations Conference on 9-10 October. There was tough competition from schools including Oakham, Manchester Grammar and Shrewsbury, as well as some delegations from overseas.

With the aim to debate from the perspective of a particular country, Emily, Mollie, Ben, Harriet, Caitlin and Alistair represented the Central African Republic whilst Sam, Mimi, Anna, Mariko, Tawana and Thomas represented Bolivia.

The whole team did superbly well to secure a record number of awards. Pride of place went to Tawana who won the Science and Environment committee, whilst Harriet and Emily were highly commended, meaning a top three finish, in the Historical and Political committees respectively. In addition, Mariko, Anna and Sam were all commended, meaning a top five finish for their debating too.

In the overall team awards, both Bolivia and the Central African Republic were commended, placing them both in the top 5 teams in the final reckoning, whilst Caitlin and Mollie also received an award for their performance in the General Assembly.

KIMBOLTON DAY OF LANGUAGES

Fitzpiers - winners of the Prep's 'Cultural Catwalk' competition.

Bonjour, Hola!, Buongiorno ... The whole school celebrated Kimbolton's Day of Languages on 27 September, with pupils enjoying a packed programme of linguistic and cultural activities - as well as a delicious lunch, with menus in French and Spanish. For the Upper Prep, a highlight of the day was the 'Cultural Catwalk' inter-House competition, in which children from each House represented a Frenchspeaking country. Points were awarded for presentation, creativity, music choice -



and enthusiasm! Pupils also enjoyed listening to a French story, Bon Appétit! Monsieur Lapin (click below), read by 23 different members of staff, and watched a French film, Ernest et Céléstine in the Hunter Hall. At the Lower Prep, Year 2 enjoyed a French breakfast as well as activities and games with our A Level language students.

Meanwhile. activities at the Senior School included a Duo Lingo challenge, a word tree, cake sale, lunchtime 'talking points' with conversation starters, a quiz, meetings of the International Society, French and Spanish clubs, and a dedicated modern foreign languages book display in the Vanbrugh Library.

A Council of Europe initiative, the European Day of Languages has been celebrated every year since 2001. The main message of the day is that language skills are a necessity and a right for everyone, young and old, opening up opportunities and helping us to understand each other better.

Mrs Marta Viruete Navarro, Head of Modern Foreign Languages at Kimbolton, said: "Our aim is to promote the rich linguistic diversity of Europe and raise awareness of the importance of lifelong language learning for all our pupils. We have decided to celebrate our Day of Languages so that all languages are included, not only European. The two assemblies held in the WBLT and the Lewis Hall in the Senior School were led by our pupils and brought together the whole community so that staff and pupils alike could share their linguistic skills in a variety of languages. A few pupils did not know that other non-MFL teachers could speak in different languages!"

INSPIRING SCIENTISTS OF THE FUTURE

Lower Prep pupils came face to face with exotic animals including Wilma the lizard, Annie the frog and Jeff the corn snake during an exciting 'Animal Encounters' workshop. The session was part of KSTEM (1-5 November), our biennial whole school celebration of Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths. Visiting animal expert Chris Welbourn spoke to the children about animal habitats, life cycles, and the different stages of development and growth.

Other events for Prep pupils this week include Biology workshops for Years 3-5, an interactive Physics demonstration by Senior School teacher Mr Wigington, a Royal Institution lecture presentation, and a hands-on Lego workshop.

Meanwhile, at the Senior School, pupils are enjoying a similarly packed programme of events. Highlights include 'Stand up Scientist' Ian Dunne, a STEM careers talk for the Lower 6th. and Octas workshops where 4th Form GCSE pupils used dowel and rubber bands to create a tunnel of Octahedrons - a fun challenge involving DTE, Maths, fine and gross motor skills, problem-solving and teamwork.

We also welcomed 'Science Magician' Dr Matt Pritchard to the Hunter Hall and William Brown Lecture Theatre, for sessions with both Prep and Senior pupils. His shows were packed with science tricks, stunts and puzzles as pupils were challenged to

develop their critical thinking skills and discover the sneaky scientific secrets behind the surprising illusions!

Senior School KSTEM organiser Mr Wigington said: "I hope the week has provided all pupils with exciting and memorable experiences, encouraging them to develop their skills, ask questions, and become inspired about future careers in STEM subjects."



CCF News

KIMBOLTON CADETS REPRESENT CCF AT THE CENOTAPH

Thirty Kimbolton School CCF cadets (including cadets from St Peter's School) from Fourth Form to the Upper Sixth represented all Combined Cadet Forces across the country in London at the weekend, in support of the Royal British Legion's Acts of Remembrance - a once-in-a-lifetime honour. Fifteen cadets were involved with the Festival of Remembrance at the Royal Albert Hall on Saturday, and then the other 15 paraded past the Cenotaph on Sunday in front of the Royal Family, political leaders, current and ex-members of the Armed Forces and World War veterans.

In Kimbolton village, we also commemorated The Fallen as the School's CCF, along with village youth groups, supported the Kimbolton Branch of the Royal British Legion in its annual parade and Act of Remembrance along the High Street and at St Andrew's church.

ANDREW BAMFORD

First, the historical perspective. John Stratford's school history From Churchyard To Castle (published in 2000) pays tribute to long-serving members of staff at Kimbolton over two centuries – from George Cole in pre-Victorian times (portrait in the White Hall) to Cyril Gibbard (1911-53) through to many stalwarts from the late 20th century epitomised by Geoff Coles (1958-94) and Roy Butler (1962-2000). All dedicated their working lives to the school, and this pattern continues, with numerous present teachers, male and female, near or at the 25-year 'qualification' required for inclusion in the Stratford pantheon.

Colleagues, pupils, OKs and parents all love staff who commit themselves long-term to the school in this way – and of no one is this truer than Andrew, who retired in July after 37 years' service.



He arrived in 1984 from Bury Grammar School and Selwyn College Cambridge to teach in Philip Burkett's History Department. Initially a boarding tutor living in White House and then Kim House, his pastoral skills had their first recognition with promotion to joint Head of Balyes with Frank Burns in 1990. When Philip Burkett's successor, Philip Armitage, died suddenly on the football pitch one Tuesday afternoon in autumn 1990, Andrew was the natural choice, even at just 29, for the role of Head of History – so Room Six in the Orangery and P11 and P14 in the Castle became the Bamford domain, and remained so for the next 31 years.

Andrew's History Department flourished, with an impressive range of teachers and tip-top academic results supplemented by a gamut of tours and visits - yes, the annual high-profile, mass-participation trips to Paris, Versailles, Berlin, Munich and the 1WW Battlefields, but also the smaller, curriculum-enriching visits to places like Hughenden Manor (home of Disraeli), Apsley House ('No 1, London', where the Duke of Wellington's windows were smashed by demonstrators in 1830) and the Civil War Museum at Newark. All these in their different ways reflected Andrew's deep knowledge and passion for English history and for carrying his pupils along with him in his enthusiasm.

We used to have a section in the Kimboltonian called Further Afield, and in the era before globe-trotting sports tours, the furthest of these were mainly Andrew's initiatives. With vision, energy and administrative skill he took groups of Sixth Formers to Russia, his early visits still in the Soviet era, and in 1992 he set up the first pupil exchange with Bridgewater Raritan High School in New Jersey, building on the links set up through an earlier teacher exchange involving John Greening. Andrew was truly the Founding Father of the US Exchange, enabling hundreds of Lower Sixth formers to enjoy the educational, social and cultural experience of the Exchange over more than 25 years until the pandemic intervened.

The US Exchange was run with the Politics and English Departments. The replacement of Public Affairs with Politics, and the creation of a new A Level department under Chris (and later Alison) Bates was transformational, and soon History and Politics became a popular and highly successful combination of subject choices, its success shown by the large numbers going on to read these subjects at university. This Bamford/Bates axis later came to be at the academic centre of the Belbin era, with Andrew as Head of Sixth Form and Chris as Director of Studies (later Deputy Head Academic).

By the end of the Roger Peel years in 2002, most of the long-serving stalwarts mentioned earlier had retired, and Andrew was given his main leadership role. He had previously run the Sixth Form Club (a three-evenings-a-week drinking den in the bowels of the Castle – yes, really!) and introduced the annual Sixth Form Ball (never a leavers' event, but for the whole Sixth Form), but being Head of Sixth Form, a new post created for him by Jonathan Belbin, involved much more than partying and cheerleading.

Along with the big personality, the booming Lancashire accent, the jokes, the anecdotes and the sense of fun, the famed 'Va Va Voom', Andrew was developing a real vision of the Sixth Form as a place where pupils developed the confidence to flourish both academically and personally.

Previously, there was annual worry about how many Fifth Formers might leave and go to Hinchingbrooke, Long Road or elsewhere. Now, numbers in the Lower Sixth grew, with many talented pupils joining from other schools, including some from families looking for just two years of private education. Andrew promoted the Sixth Form and its pupils constantly, not just through his own example and energy but also through inspiring enthusiasm in others, pupils and staff alike. There was (and is) something for everyone: Sixth Form facilities, the Citizenship programme, the UCAS processes, the tutoring system along with so much drama, sport, music, service activities, a vibrant house championship. Under Andrew's leadership, every Sixth Former felt part of the whole, and enjoyed it.

All readers who were at the school between 1984 and last July will have their Bamford memories. Mine include exchanging draft UCAS references by email between the Careers Room and his office in the dungeons deep into a winter's evening, and once even between one Battlefields tour bus and another. I remember flying to the US with him as members of the Exchange party were getting copious free drinks from British Airways (one was seriously hungover when we arrived in Bridgewater). I remember him being told off by the Beefeaters for over-enthusiastic guiding at the Tower of London, and later him chivvying a bemused-looking group of students to "move and groove" before it was pointed out that they were from a different school.

But anyone who has had the privilege of being Andrew's colleague or pupil over the years will know that it's his acts of kindness that mean most. When a Balyes pupil was anxious about returning to school after a suspension, it was Andrew who brokered and hosted a meeting between the boy and the Headmaster in the comfortable environment of his house in Castle Gardens. When a cricket-loving retired colleague was struggling with early-onset dementia, it was Andrew who organised and took him for a day at Lord's. When school tragedies such as the death of Michael Nutkins in 2005 shook the Sixth Form, it was Andrew that spoke to and for everyone at the funeral. I've heard Andrew's speeches in many different circumstances over the years: he's a master of the art, and always fully prepared with hand-written notes.

Lest this sounds like an obituary, I'm glad to say that one evening recently (Aug 21) Andrew and I went down the A1 in the car together for our umpteenth Watford/Crystal Palace match, the difference this time being that we were accompanied by 15-yearold Anna, sporting her new Palace shirt and twittering away to her dad with all the latest Palace gossip.

And last Sunday (Nov 7th), he was his usual exuberant self as the new Curator of the Castle, a role he has taken over from Nora Butler, welcoming visitors, sharing his knowledge and enthusiasm and also bringing in new ideas – in this case, including Lower Sixth formers in the team of guides.

Two things remain to be said, both of them evident at Andrew's retirement party at the Castle in August. First, his ability to connect and have genuine friendships across the generations: his guest list extended from Philip Burkett's widow Jean, now well into her 90s, through many friends of four decades, including colleagues in their 20s.

And at his side, Lisa. She first came to Kimbolton for a year in 1993 as a "left-wing artist-in-residence with red hair and leggings" (Andrew's words) and after a long courtship involving many weekend miles in a small Peugeot between Kimbolton and Millfield (with occasional stops at Selhurst Park), they were married at the Castle in 1999. What joy! Their partnership has been at the very heart of Kimbolton life in the years since.

A few weeks ago (Oct 21) Andrew texted to say that he, Lisa and Anna are moving from Thurleigh to Hartford, barely a mile from the Skinners in Wyton. We've invited them to supper on moving day – much hilarious talk is guaranteed!

CHRIS BATES

Chris Bates retired as Deputy Head (Academic) in July 2021, after 30 years dedicated service to the Kimbolton School Community. He leaves a massive legacy in so many ways from curriculum innovation to making the Politics Department a "blue riband" in terms of academic standards and innovative teaching. Above all, a wise and humane counsellor, he has influenced the lives of generations of Kimbolton students and set the benchmark for professionalism for the teaching staff.

Chris joined the school as Head of Public Affairs and a teacher of history in September 1991. It was a very difficult time for the History Department as we grappled with the unexpected death of Philip Armitage in October 1990 and I was looking for two new teachers to take the department forward. We struck gold with Craig Woodgate and Chris Bates. Chris immediately transformed Public Affairs into Politics and within a few years Politics became one of the four biggest departments at A levels, both in terms of the quantity of students and quality of results. Chris made the subject come alive not only in terms of the lessons but by the whole host of extracurricular links he developed from the Politics Society, Amnesty International to the Philosophy Discussion Group.



There was no dumbing down but a raising of expectations. Lured by the prospect of unusual coffee, many students first learnt about Nietzsche or Locke in P10 on a Friday evening after school. The fact that he could run this intellectual club at 4.30 on a Friday and attract a good cross section of the school from the 3rd Form and above is testament to his charisma and legendary status at Kimbolton. He had a large teaching load in the History Department as well with many courses foisted on him by me including documents on the Norman Conquest to the Cambridge History Project covering 1000 years of British History. It was so much fun working with him, especially at the annual Upper Sixth Leavers BBQ in our garden with Chris driving the pupils over in a minibus and reading out his yearly poem with a pen portrait of each of our charges.

Commitment to History and Politics extended to a large number of school trips. Chris was very committed to the American Exchange and completed many trips to our partnership school in Bridgewater New Jersey which gave him the opportunity to visit Washington and in particular the Supreme Court of which he wrote several scholarly articles. He tried to inject a degree of sanity on numerous History trips to the Battlefields, Berlin and Russia in contrast with the rather excitable Head of History! It was Chris who first found the grave of OK Philip Stubbs at Thiepval which has become a place of pilgrimage on the annual 3rd Form visit to the Somme, and remained calm at the infamous Rossiya Hotel in Moscow with its distinctive array of prostitutes, Kalashnikov's and cockroaches. He even managed to find Amit Patel who got off the metro at the wrong stop on his way to the Pere Lachaise Cemetery - no easy feat in a pre-mobile phone world. He particularly enjoyed residential Sixth Form trips in the minibus to places such as Gladstone's Library at Hawarden, though by day three on these trips many of the students were broken, hence the question from the curator at Shugborough as to whether Kimbolton was a Special School. Aside from History and Politics Chris also made a massive impact on the sports field, most notably in his first love of hockey.

Chris also played a massive role in the pastoral side of the school. Starting as a tutor in Owens House, within one year of joining Kimbolton he was running Kim House. He did this for 7 years and certainly proved to be a worthy successor to Roy Butler in chalking up triumph after triumph for Dawsons in the House Championship. He created a fantastic ethos in Kim House. In particular he was wonderfully supportive of Graham Mott after his life changing accident, driving his friends up to Sheffield regularly to see Graham in hospital, masterminding his return to school and even running the London Marathon in aid of spinal research. After 7 years at Kimbolton House it was time to move on, especially when his son Alex asked when he would have to move out of his parents' accommodation and join the other boys in the House.

Critical and logical thinking soon led Chris to take up new key leadership responsibilities in the School forging a new curriculum initiative in his role as Director of Studies, which was transformed into Deputy Head Academic when the Senior Leadership Team was established. Here Chris piloted through some seismic changes at Kimbolton, notably the reorganisation of the timetable and the end of Saturday school and, Kimbolton becoming a digital school with the introduction of iPads for all pupils. It was Chris's grasp of detail, ability to explain and diplomacy which meant that these changes were introduced smoothly, with less technically confident colleagues feeling reassured whilst others were given license to innovate. Not only was the timetable changed, but it allowed Sixth Form students to benefit from a super curriculum with the 7th period giving them an opportunity to research beyond the confines of the curriculum, with Politics leading the way with its Bates inspired blogs. He made provision for Citizenship lectures from outside speakers each Friday and a really exciting diet of practical and academic challenges offered on a Thursday afternoon. He really focused teachers to look at education in its widest sense and colleagues from other schools always looked with envy at the foresight from Kimbolton. In a crisis you need someone at the academic helm with vision, dedication and selflessness and the fact that the School was able to handle the Covid 19 pandemic so well is largely due to Chris. Just think what might have happened if Gavin Williamson had been Deputy Head (Academic)! Unfortunately, CAGs and other constant U turns from the educational establishment took their toll of Chris's health in his last few weeks at School; but I am delighted to report he is now back to his old self enjoying the academic challenges of his PhD on Thomas Jefferson at Edinburgh University.

Of course, throughout these 30 years Kimbolton has benefitted from the Bates partnership, with Ali an equally influential figure in the formative development of so many pupils, as well as keeping Chris on the straight and narrow. All at Kimbolton are delighted that she is continuing in her vital roles with UCAS, Debating and Politics. Of course, Kimbolton has also been a family affair for the Bates's with both Alex and Sophie having distinguished school careers here.

Chris Bates will surely go down as one of the key figures in the history of the School over the last 50 years. He has achieved so much visibly in terms of results and innovation but more importantly he has been a role model to generations of pupils and staff. He has a strong moral compass and his whole approach was governed by kindness and humanity.

I am sure he will enjoy a long and fulfilling retirement. Thank you, Chris.

EDWARD VALLETTA

When the now ex-bursar Mr. Edward Valletta first arrived at Kimbolton in May of 1999, it was AGI Day. Being a man with military as part of both his career history and education (he had attended the Royal Military Academy Sandhurst), this was sure to have had an impact on first impressions. Later on, he found himself walking around the school and thought to himself "this school is absolutely stunning." In the twenty-two years that have passed since that day, Mr. Valletta's opinion of the school remains unchanged and as high as ever, despite the changes and transformations that the school has seen in that time, many of which he had a hand in personally overseeing.

Most notable of these innovations is the construction of the original Queen Katherine Building, despite having been what he describes as a "disastrous build." Nevertheless, it was the construction of this building that was a fundamental step in the right direction for the school. "That took us out of the old Kimbolton School and put us into a new Kimbolton School. Before, we had the Spinney building and we had the Orangery, which were very old 1960s-1970s pre-fab classrooms, and we were very much stuck in old ways of doing things."



Indeed, the Kimbolton we know today may not exist as it currently does without the consistently reliable and tactile approach Mr. Valletta has applied to the school during his time here, an achievement that will surely stand tall amongst the impressive legacy he leaves behind.

"I became a bursar because I saw the bursar at my old school and I saw what a fantastic job he did and what a lovely life he had in beautiful surroundings, and I thought 'that is a job I will do one day.'" Originally, Mr. Valletta had a fixed plan in mind for his future after he left the army; he had stayed at his previous school for 5 years, he would then stay at Kimbolton for 10 years, and then move on to the next school. However, as time went on, he found it was getting harder and harder to leave, largely because he found himself loving the school so much that he didn't want to go. He felt entrenched in the school, in part because his children were attending it at the time and were also loving it.

"I've done all I can here. The pandemic hasn't helped, but I'm feeling older and it needs to go to someone younger who has more energy than I do." Mr. Valletta regrets leaving at an odd time (as opposed to the end of the year) and without the expected fanfare that something as momentous as this would warrant, and would have liked to stay longer. However, he feels that his replacement, Mrs. Agnew, would need to be brought in before the summer in order to put into effect her changes as soon as possible.

Mr. Valletta singles out the construction of the second QKB as one of, if not the endeavour he is proudest to have been a part of during his time at Kimbolton. He was fundamental to working out the logistics behind its construction and implementing specific teachers' requests into the layout of the building. "It's a great building. I'm very proud of that building." Mr. Valletta has summed up his duties to the school in relation to the headmaster: Mr. Belbin's role is to bring in and educate pupils, and his job is everything else.

In terms of what comes after Kimbolton, Mr. Valletta will be embarking on a five-week building course, a complete departure from anything he's done before, and with which he intends to "rewire rather than retire," and feels that it will be a suitable direction to head in without having to start a new career. Additionally, Mr. Valletta, a big fan of country music, has purchased tickets for such musical artists as the Shires and the Wandering Hearts, and will see them as soon as the restrictions allow.

Mr. Valletta officially left his position on the 6th of April 2021.

NORA BUTLER

After over twenty years, Nora Butler retired from her role as Castle Curator in the summer of 2021. She leaves behind an enormous legacy and has been instrumental in bringing alive the history of the Castle to a wider audience, whilst at the same time undertaking much scholarly research into the history of our wonderful castle and the families that owned and lived in it.

Unstinting in her hours of dedication, Nora has masterminded Castle Opening, marshalling a whole army of steward volunteers mainly from Kimbolton Local History Society to bring the history of the building alive to thousands of visitors over the years. She has also made the Castle accessible to children with Tudor and Victorian trails for local schools to dressing up boxes at Castle Opening. The memory of the Castle's most famous resident was kept alive with the inauguration of the annual Katharine of Aragon service each January on the anniversary of her death. With grants from the Wingfield family, Nora designed the Heritage Room in the Castle with informative boards and artefacts enabling visitors and pupils to have a complete overview of the Castle from its medieval origins to its acquisition by the School in 1950. She has also undertaken valuable research in a whole host of areas ranging from the history of the grounds to thwarted plans in the Victorian era to extend the Castle.



She has been tenacious in ensuring that the fabric of the building is respected and was prepared to stand her ground if there were plans mooted to "modernise" key parts of the building such as the Chapel. Her knowledge of the village and Parish Church has also enabled the Castle to be fully seen in the context of the local area. She has researched some of the rather chaotic archives left by the Dukes of Manchester and it was fitting that one of her last acts as Curator was to arrange for the Kimbolton History Society to purchase and donate a portrait of the 5th Duke of Manchester to the Castle. Following its journey from South Africa, it now hangs proudly in the White Hall. Above all, Nora's love for everything Kimbolton permeates everything she has achieved and both the School and community owe her and Roy a tremendous debt of gratitude not only in her most recent role but to nearly sixty years service to Kimbolton School.



The Return of the Friendly Invader

Kimbolton has deep links with the United States. Edward Maria Wingfield whose family owned Kimbolton Castle was the first President of the Jamestown Colony, the first English speaking colony in the New World. Two Dukes of Manchester married Americans and the parish church has the only Tiffany window in the UK, whilst in more recent times we have been lucky to participate in our annual exchange with Bridgewater-Raritan High School in New Jersey. However, the most important link was forged in the Second World War with RAF Kimbolton becoming the "friendly invasion" of our American allies. On the site of the present Bicton industrial estate, between May 1943 and June 1945 the airfield was the home of the USAF 379th Bombardment Group, which operated B-17 bombers. The 379th holds the distinction of having flown the largest number of WWII sorties.

Chris Bates, (see earlier Staffroom News), forged a strong connection with the 379th Bomb Group Association and was instrumental in building up an impressive collection of memorabilia from our American friends in a specially constructed cabinet in the Orangery. This collection has been added to in a wonderful way thanks to a special donation by the Cavaliere family from Fairfax, Virginia. In 2019, Robert Cavaliere was clearing out his mother's house who had just passed away. He went into a clothes closet and discovered it was slightly bigger than he remembered.

At the back of the closet were some bags and Robert was astonished to find that they were the flying jacket, two dress uniforms and personal kit and effects of his father, Paul, who had died in 1984, but had served in the US 379th at Kimbolton Airfield in the Second World War. Paul flew more than 20 missions as a B-17 Flying Fortress navigator with the Kimbolton-based 379th Bomb Group in 1945.

Robert and his family thought carefully about how to preserve these wonderful, historic effects and remembered the connection with Kimbolton School. They therefore donated the uniforms and personal effects to Kimbolton School, where they are proudly displayed. Now that Covid restrictions have eased, we were delighted to welcome Robert (Bob), his sister Joan to Kimbolton. They were present for the Last Post Ceremony at Kimbolton School on November 11th as well as laying a wreath at the Kimbolton Airfield Remembrance Day ceremony on 14th November before attending the Kimbolton High Street Remembrance Sunday Parade of the British Legion and Kimbolton School Cadets and Act of Remembrance. They also visited the American Cemetery at Madingley and the Imperial War Museum, Duxford.

Explaining his donation, Bob said "If the family kept them they would have been in a closet somewhere until I died and then no one else would have wanted them. But here, they can be on display for many to see, and the photographs and navigational instruments, along with the uniforms, tell a story that none of us siblings knew very much about when my dad was alive, a missed opportunity to learn about an amazing time in his life. So there was no question in my mind but that the school would treat the items with reverence and make them much more widely available to the public than they would have been anywhere else we could have given them to."

Reflecting back on his visit, Bob said, "It was eye-opening, and humbling, to experience the reverence in which the American and English servicemen from both World Wars are still held." It was especially emotional for him to find out that his Dad's usual plane, Seattle Sue, had crashed upon take-off a mere one week after his father's last mission.

There is a display in the Orangery Corridor, together with other memorabilia relating to Kimbolton School families and the First World War.

I had the pleasure of meeting James and Andrew Whitworth, the sons of David Whitworth (OK'39) and the nephews of John Whitworth (OK'40) in the Autumn of 2021.

Since the passing of David in 2017, Andrew and James had been keen to visit the school, and after a long delay due to Covid, they finally managed to make the visit in November 2021. It was a very heartfelt visit as James and Andrew had very little insight in to their fathers and uncles time at Kimbolton. In fact they knew very little of their past until they unearthed files and boxes of Kimbolton memorabilia whilst sorting through their late father's possessions. Andrew explained that their father was always reluctant to talk about his past, as the loss of his brother and the effects that the war had on him were too great.

After leaving Kimbolton, John joined the RAF becoming an Air Gunner as part of the No 103 Bomb Squadron. Tragically in July 1944, John was killed in action whilst on a bombing mission to Germany when his Lancaster Bomber was shot down. He was laid to rest in the South of France. After leaving Kimbolton, David also joined the forces enroling at The Royal Military College at Sandhurst and becoming an active member of the No 15 Platoon, C Company Infantry.

OKA Accounts - Year Ending 31 August 2021

 ∥ hilst the income generated in the year to August 2021 was very low due to the absence of OK events, the accounts ended the year in a positive position. Expenditure was kept to a minimum due to the OKA magazine being produced online, with no printing and postage costs and with minimal additional expenditure throughout the year, the OKA balance sheet remains healthy.

The OKA receives subscription income from the School and ad hoc voluntary contributions from OKs. This income covers the running costs of the Association, including subsidies for young OKs to attend OKA events, the publication of the OK News magazine and various OK sporting activities. As a non-profit making organisation, OKA events are carefully planned and managed so as to break-even, however from time to time an unplanned profit is made. When this occurs, the profit is donated to the OK Scholarship Trust Fund.

The Association's income (through membership fees, sale of merchandise, donations and bank interest received) was slightly below that of the previous financial year. Costs associated with running the Association decreased significantly due to the OKA Magazine being produced online, this led to a small profit of £2880 for the year. All expenditure is focussed on moving the Association forward and the OKA Committee are grateful that funds continue to enable this.

The Committee would like to take this opportunity to thank Krista Alves, Deputy Bursar, for her guidance and support in maintaining the OKA Accounts.

The OK Lodge of Freemasons (Lodge No 7204)

The Lodge had 3 successful meetings in 2021, held in the months of October (2 meetings) and December. We didn't have our usual March, May and September meetings due to Covid restrictions but, we still gained 1 new member who had patiently been waiting to join since December 2019!

Peter Wright (left the School 1957) was probably our most mature Old Kimboltonian to join The Lodge being a very vibrant and joyful 81 year old! Our previous new member was 23; some of our existing members, in 2021 celebrated, their 96th, 97th and 99th birthdays. Being a Freemason is obviously good for one's longevity but for sure no barrier to youth!!

Like all the activities that 'work' under the banner of The Old Kimboltonians Association the Lodge is successful, being recognised in the Province of Northamptonshire and Huntingdonshire as a very happy and vibrant Lodge. We are 2nd in membership out of nearly 100 lodges in the Province albeit our members can only be those who have attended the School as either a pupil or member of staff.

The Lodge was formed in 1952 and held its first meeting in the Castle on the 11th September in that year; the leading lights in the founding of the Lodge were William Ingram, Cyril Gibbard and George Hunt all very well known in the history of Kimbolton School.

The Lodge as with the Old Kimboltonians Association is deeply loyal to the School and along with the Association donates as much to the School as a society with a membership of 60 is able to do. In recent years The Lodge has made an annual donation of £3,600 to the Headmaster's Bursary Fund along with the Debating Cup with a prize of £50 for the winners. We have also awarded a small bursary, £250, to a recent leaver of the School for three years to assist with her music studies. We are soon to have discussions to see if we can increase our donations to the School, but more of this next year!

In February the Lodge usually holds a luncheon followed by a musical entertainment and in the Summer we would usually hold a grand occasion comprising of Dinner, Concert & Firework display, but sadly we lost both of these events to Covid restrictions

In spite of reduced fund raising occasions The Lodge continued with it's donation of £3,600 to the Bursary Fund via the Old Kimboltonians Scholarship Trust so ably chaired by Michael Capps who along with his wife, Penny, is a regular supporter of The Lodge social occasions.

For the current year of 2022 The Lodge has its usual 5 meetings in Kimbolton Castle and a 6th in London which has been held on Saturday, February 5th. This meeting was introduced due to an influx of members from London and surrounds; it enables these members who live in and around London to have a reasonable travel time. The meeting is held at Mark Masons Hall in St. James, Piccadilly, just next to St. James' Palace, a very grand building with a very large portrait of Michael Herbert, an Old Kimboltonian, hanging in a very prominent place on the main staircase.

With regard to social functions, to which all are very welcome - wives, family, friends and especially Old Kimboltonians - we are holding our annual Summer Dinner, Piano Concert and Fireworks on Saturday June 25th; contact John Hitchin for details.

The proceeds from this event, which is being held in the name of the Geoff Coles Memorial Fund, to help The Lodge to continue its support of the Old Kimboltonians Scholarship Fund along with Macmillan Nurses; a cause so dear to Geoff Coles who was for a long time Secretary of the Old Kimboltonians Lodge and a key member of the Old Kimboltonians Association over many years.

In 2017 Freemasonry celebrated the 300th anniversary of the first Grand Lodge of England which shows the ageless appeal of a fraternity that promotes traditional virtues among its members; as well as being actively involved with charitable causes; as charity begins at home the Old Kimboltonians Lodges main giving is to the School. It's also a great deal of fun too!

Although The Old Kimboltonians' Lodge was founded in 1952 (very young in Masonic terms there being Lodges still active which were founded in the early 1700s) ... Kimbolton Castle, through the Dukes of Manchester, has Masonic connections going back to the eighteenth century of the 4th Duke of Manchester, was Grand Master of England, 1780-1786, his portrait is in the Green Room and the 7th Duke, who was the local 'ruler' aka Provincial Grand Master 1863-1887.

Occasionally I receive questions about women and freemasonry; so just to clarify, ladies can be freemasons and our website, which can be seen as part of the OK's website www.oklodge.org , will give links for any ladies who might be interested; please be in contact with myself. On a final but very important note, the Lodge has met in the Castle since 1952 and I would like to put on the record the Lodge's continuing thanks to the Governors and Headmaster, Jonathan Belbin for their kind permission for us to meet in these wonderful surroundings.

VICKY BECKWITH (OK'86) has recently had a paper published in the Waikato Journal of Education :- Parents' perceptions of global citizenship education in rural Aotearoa New Zealand - http://wje.org.nz/index.php/WJE

Vicky is a Literacy & Numeracy Leader at Universal College of Learning & PhD student, and presented this paper at the Oceania Comparative and International Education Society (OCIES) conference at the beginning of December. She is also part of a post-graduate panel during the pre-conference's new and emerging researcher workshop where she presented her perspectives of Positionality, and Vicky has also been awarded an Emerging Researcher Scholarship by OCIES.

On the global citizenship side, she is continuing her research as a PhD student with the University of Waikato and is working on a second paper on global citizenship due to be submitted shortly.



In other news, Vicky has been actively involved in promoting dyslexia awareness, including leading the Dyslexia-Friendly Quality Mark (DFQM) trial at UCOL Horowhenua, which has resulted in that campus becoming the first ITP (Institutes of Technology & Polytechnics) to achieve the quality mark in Aotearoa New Zealand. Vicky gave an information presentation about the DFQM at the 2021 ITP Research Symposium in November and submitted a paper to the proceedings journal. www.dfqm.nz

Vicky would also be very keen to get in touch and willing to offer support and guidance to any OK's residing in New Zealand.

Arctic Reunion

It was a chilly reunion for two OKs who reunited this March in Tromsø, Norway, as Lieutenant Julian Caithness (OK'11) and Lieutenant Mat Hendery (OK'12) ended up working side by side in the Maritime Component of a large scale NATO exercise in the Arctic Circle. The pair worked in close proximity as their two vessels manoeuvred together for the month-long "Cold Response 22" exercise. This exercise, involving over 25,000 soldiers, sailors, and airmen from 28 countries, tested NATO's ability to repel an invasion from a major power in the high north of Norway.



Julian joined the Royal Navy in 2014 as a Warfare Officer and, after a training position in the Helicopter Carrier HMS OCEAN, served for two and a half years as an Officer of the Watch on the Frigate HMS SUTHERLAND, where he also held the roles of the Ship's Boarding Officer and Intelligence Officer. He is now serving as the Senior Officer of the Watch in the Amphibious Assault ShIp HMS ALBION, responsible for the management of the Bridge team. Next year he will be travelling to the USA on a two year exchange with the US Navy where he will be the Navigating Officer of the Guided Missile Destroyer USS WINSTON S. CHURCHILL.

Mat completed a BEng in Aerospace Engineering before going on to earn an Engineering Doctorate and a place in the nuclear sector of Rolls-Royce as a Materials Technologist. Here he covers material aspects of the entire plant lifecycle from liaising with Design Engineers in the early stages through to being a principal failure investigator of exservice components. He joined the Royal Navy Reserves in 2016 and was subsequently trained as an Amphibious Warfare Officer. He was mobilised for this deployment, which is his first active tour, to work alongside HMS ALBION in the Royal Fleet Auxilliary vessel RFA MOUNTS BAY where he works as part of the Ship-To-Objective Manoeuvre (STOM) cell. This team coordinates the movement of personnel, equipment, stores, and vehicles ashore via landing craft and helicopter, and provides a communication link between the ground forces and maritime units.

Both Mat and Jules were enthusiastic members of the CCF at Kimbolton and owe their current military careers to the foundation they learnt in the cadets.

We wrote in last year's OKA magazine about the stop-start 12 months for Arthurian League football with the various lockdowns. The uncertainty of whether football matches would go ahead continued throughout much of 2021.

The Arthurian League season was abandoned January- March 2021, thwarting the opportunity to secure promotion. However, the cup competitions were able to resume as we came out of lockdown (number whatever it was?!). Four months without fixtures meant friendlies were required ahead of the Arthur Dunn ('Dunn') and Junior League Cup ('JLC') competitions restarting. An evening weekday game on the 1st April saw a 3-0 victory vs premier league side, Old Alleynians, which was followed by a 1-1 draw against Div 1 side, Old Reptonians on the 10th April. Two good results to give the OKs momentum going into the quick succession of knockout cup matches:

- The 17th April Dunn Round of 16 tie vs Division 1 side, Old Malvernians, saw the OKs victorious, beating the 17x Dunn Cup winners 5-3, which included a hat-trick from Henry Langley
- The 24th April JLC Round of 16 tie vs Old Sennockians saw a 3-1 victory
- On the 1st May, the OKs beat Old Radelians 2-1 in the JLC guarter final
- On 8th May, the OKs were knocked out of the Dunn in the ¼ final, losing 3-2 against Old Salopians
- On 15th May the OKs lost to a strong Old Ardinians side in the JLC semi-final.

After a relaxing summer break, the OKs returned to the field in September, turning their attention to the 2021/22 Arthurian League season. The first game saw a 4-2 loss to Old Cholmelians II, but the next three fixtures were cancelled due to our opponents failing to get sides together. In fact, three teams subsequently pulled out the league for the season as this phenomenon continued. Clearly a lagged impact from Covid, with the resumption of weddings, stag do's and holidays putting pressure on most league teams' availability. The OKs were not immune from this lack of availability: we were gladly helped by three school 1st XI players during our next fixture vs Old Brentwood II in October which saw the OKs come from two goals down to secure the point; but saw a disappointing result away in Shrewsbury to a very strong Old Salopians side in the first round of the Dunn.

November, however, saw a renewed availability, and the OKs have been able to go on a good run of form, with seven wins and two draws up until the time of writing (9th February 2022), which has included 5-0 wins vs the School first XI and Old Shirburnians (the latter in the JLC round of 16), as well as a thumping 10-0 league win at home to Old Tonbridgians II, which saw Josh Smith score five!

Top of the league, with three league games to go, and a JLC ¼ final vs Old Etonians IIs, the OKs are eyeing-up a third promotion and another good cup run going into the home straight for the season.

We'd like to send our best wishes to Allan Owen, who we wish a speedy recovery having undergone surgery to repair his Achilles which he ruptured during a league game in January. We would also like to thank the School, the Headmaster, Chris Hope, Tony Lawless, and the OKA for their constant support of the Club. The connection between all parties has allowed the OKFC to continue thriving and progressing, with school leavers coming-up through the ranks of the Club. Long may it continue!



In 2019, Joanna left Ratcliffe College to take up the position of Deputy Head (Pastoral) at Sidcot School in Somerset and, with Rachael and Christopher settled in the London area, we decided it might be wise to be closer to at least one of the family. We are not getting any younger!

We put the house on the market and the pandemic struck - attempting to move certainly presented some challenges. Unable to stay anywhere over night, we made several trips to Somerset and back in the day, viewing five houses at a time. Eventually we found the house we wanted and moved at the end of January 2021.

We haven't downsized and ignored the gentle steer from the family that a small retirement bungalow would be appropriate!

In 2020 my hip had collapsed on me so, on arrival in Somerset, the first of many tasks was to find a consultant and in May I had a full left hip replacement. It has certainly changed my life for the better and I am gambolling up the Mendips which rise behind our house. This is a delightful area and we have been particularly fortunate to end up in Draycott, an incredibly friendly place, situated 1.5 miles from Cheddar and 5.5 miles from Wells.

By chance, Catherine Lynn (OK '97) and her family live in the village and she kindly entertained us late in the summer when her mother was visiting. It is a small world, but I'm not sure how many former pupils would want their old headmaster as a near neighbour!

Since I became fully mobile after sorting my hip out, we have much enjoyed exploring more widely in this marvellous county. I recommend Somerset to you all.

The twentieth anniversary of our leaving Kimbolton will be marked in the summer of 2022. When I look back, I sometimes feel as if I am looking down the wrong end of a telescope, as it all seems such a long way away. That said, Sue and I have a very rich memory bank of such a defining fifteen years in our lives. What I missed most when I left was the daily contact with young people and Sue, likewise, missed her teaching in the Spanish department.

Headmastering can be a very challenging occupation but I never lost sight of the trust placed in me by the governors when they appointed me. When I had retired from HMC, I did consultancy work appraising HMC heads and assisting governors appointing new heads, which made me appreciate the real challenge of appointing a new head.

Every new head is expected to make his/her mark on the school during their tenure of office. I hope I achieved that whilst preserving the unique ethos that makes Kimbolton School stand out. None of a school's achievements are down to the head alone, it is a team effort involving governors, staff, parents and pupils. I was always grateful for the huge support I received from all those constituencies and, of course, from Sue who was always at my side when things got tough.

Would I do it all again? Absolutely! I recognise that today's challenges are very different from twenty years ago, but there is so much joy to be had from working with young people in a positive school environment.

I have been fortunate to enjoy an extremely good relationship with Jonathan Belbin, who is a good friend. It has been a thrill for me to see the school prosper and grow under his guidance.

As an honorary OK (I think I'm allowed to make that claim) I feel I can join you all and feel very proud of "our" old school. Sue and I send our best wishes.



The traditional route to selection for the England hockey team is via progression up through school, county and then regional squads. I had been fortunate to be selected for the east region squad in 2019 and as the next step I hoped to secure a place in The Futures Cup tournament in Ssummer 2020. Each region nominates one or two players who get to play in this tournament where the England selectors assess them against their peers. Unfortunately, due to Covid restrictions, the Futures Cup was cancelled and replaced with a new selection process taking place in November.

This new process actually ended up being even more competitive as it opened up opportunities for nearly 500 girls to try out. Initial trials were carried out at three venues across the country and were conducted with covid precautions in place. This phase of selection reduced the field from 500 down to about 30 who were taken through to Phase 2 trials. Here the 30 were then competing against existing England U18 players and U16s that were transitioning to the U18s.

Due to Covid wave 2, the face to face trials had to be paused. Instead, some training was initially delivered virtually, covering a number of issues such as nutrition and anti doping. The anti doping education was really eye opening as it highlighted how careful we needed to be with what we consumed, especially with some drinks that can contain banned additives.



We also had strength and conditioning exercises conducted in our living rooms over zoom! There were also challenging aerobic programmes so as to be as fit as possible when face to face selection could resume. This face to face selection eventually resumed at Lilleshall sports centre in Shropshire and Bisham Abbey in Berkshire, which are the national hockey centres for junior and senior respectively. Due to different infection rates in different areas this was disrupted as some players, including myself, were not permitted to travel to all of the sessions - in the end selection was based on reduced assessment hours which meant added pressure to perform consistently well.

This final cut would select the players who would get to play for England in the internationals in Valencia over the summer of 2021.

After a nervous wait, the news finally came through in May 2021 that I was lucky enough to get a place in the England squad. It turned out that I was one of the few from the original 500 that was selected to join the existing England U18 and U16 players.

Unfortunately, due to Covid the Valencia tournament was cancelled, so instead a home nations tournament was organised where we played Scotland, Ireland and Wales. This was an incredible experience and being fortunate enough to pull on an England shirt and stand for the national anthem is an experience I will never forget.

She was 35 years old.

She moved to London after leaving university and worked for several companies, Unilever in particular for the last 10 years. She loved her work, became Global Marketing Manager and planned to stay there.



During these last few difficult months many of us have shared our memories of her. We remember her love of life, her thought-fulness and skills. She loved to craft anything from tapestries, embroidery to knitted toys and a wide variety of cakes and baking, making any occasion a little more special. She loved to travel abroad often to follow Grand Slam tennis events. Like many people she was finding the recent travel restrictions difficult, especially not to being able to visit Matt and his family in Seattle, as well as her family in UK.

With her school friends Lucie shared a love of music, especially boy bands, usually ignoring the need to be in vogue. Her friends recall her making a cherished playlist when they all left school. She selected the perfect song for each one.

Lucie relished her independence and had bought a flat in London where she planned to raise a little girl, whom she was in the process of adopting. We were all delighted and looking forward to the time when she would have been joining our family. We would like to use this opportunity to thank everyone for all the wonderful gifts, messages and support we have received. We treasure them all. A tree will be planted in the school grounds in her memory.

He loved his time with the CCF (Army) completing many camps, activities and shooting, as well as the annual Remembrance Parade which brought the School, local community, and the Royal British Legion (RBL) together. As the then Chairman of the RBL this was a very proud day for me, especially when I had both Brynmor and his sister Poppy in the same parade as myself.

These 12 wonderful years' at Kimbolton School have created many fond memories for me and my family and ones we regularly remember with a smile on our faces.

RACHAEL CORBISHLEY (OK'10)

Rachael Corbishley died on 2nd October 2021, a few months shy of her 30th birthday, from a brain tumour that she faced with the same bravery, humour and determination she lived her life with

Rachael – or Rach as her school friends called her – joined Kimbolton aged 11, and was already all of the things she would grow up to be: gregarious, ambitious, funny and fiercely intelligent. She might have been intimidating were she not so friendly; bypassing cliques and hierarchies, she had the unique ability to be kind to everyone to see the worth in them.

Never one to waste time, Rachael immediately threw herself into school life. Beyond being a straight-A student, she took part in the gym display, the charities committee, debating, swimming competitions and school plays. Later came Young Enterprise, the Kimboltonian and prefect duties. And in case it seems like she had no time for much else, you should know that Rachael never missed a party.

When she reached fourth form, lacking any particular interest in holding a gun, and possessing that innate desire to help people that would stay with her for the rest of her life, Rachael opted for community service over the more-popular CCF option. It was a win-win, because it meant spending Thursday afternoons with her beloved sister Naomi at Spring Common, a school for children with special needs.



It was in sixth form that Rachael's principles crystalised: she became a person who knew what she stood for and what she valued, and was utterly unafraid to express it. English class nurtured a passion for reading that would continue to grow, and Politics offered the chance to argue – with passion, empathy, good humour and a lot of flamboyant hand movements. She almost always took the liberal stance and found herself outnumbered in a year group that tended towards the conservative. She didn't care. She knew what she believed. Friends, classmates, teachers – if she thought you were wrong, she'd let you know. Usually with the classic Rachael eye roll.

Alison Bates, who taught Rachael Politics, remembers her fondly:

"When I look back to my time teaching Rachael, there is one overwhelming memory that comes to me first: that huge, joyous, infectious smile. Rachael would bound into my room, full of enthusiasm – whether it was the first or last lesson of a busy day, it would make no difference. Positive, enthusiastic, brimming with ideas – she brought such a light and joy to every lesson. Beyond that ready smile, however, was a seriousness and a determination: Rachael was ambitious, conscientious and set herself high standards. Essays were not a mere chore to be endured but an opportunity to read, to think, to explore ideas. Her strong social conscience and commitment to rights and justice were always so apparent. She loved to debate and discuss ideas: well informed, she was a formidable debating opponent whether in the P10 Politics classroom or on the floor of a Model United Nations conference.



"As I approach the last stages of my teaching career at Kimbolton School, I can reflect fondly on my good fortune to have met and taught so many wonderful, inspiring young people. However, there is no doubt that Rachael will always stand out as one of the most thoughtful, intelligent and committed of all. It may be something of a teacher's cliché but she really was an utter pleasure to teach."

It was that mix of intelligence and passion that earned Rachael a place at Trinity College, Cambridge. When she went for her interview there, her future director of studies made the following note: "A real live wire! Consistently intelligent across a range of topics. Has got Things To Say about the world." He underlined the words "Things To Say". Anyone who knew her can agree with that.

At Cambridge, she studied Politics, Psychology and Sociology (classic Rachael – why take on one thing when you could take on three?), and continued her dazzling trajectory. She won a junior scholarship in her first year, organised high-profile speakers for the Cambridge Union, ran the Politics Society and fundraised for SOS Children's Villages, including a sponsored skydive – all the while seeking out those kindred spirits who were as interested in socialising as they were studying.

After graduation, a UN internship in Geneva led to a job with Save the Children in Cardiff, before Rachael moved to Cairo to work with Syrian refugees. It was the perfect career for someone with such a fire for tackling injustice. When war broke out in Yemen in 2015, she was asked to join Save the Children's response team based in Jordan, where she met her partner Alun. He remembers how she would work late into nights and weekends – yet still somehow manage to be a regular at Tequila Tuesdays and Whisky Wednesdays.

After a brief stint in London, Rachael and Alun moved to Uganda, where she managed the Education Consortium, overseeing refugee education projects for multiple organisations, including Save the Children. It was not an easy job, but as Alun put it, she "led by example and sheer force of personality". She and Alun made a home together in Kampala, and outside of work, she hung out with friends, went to parties, sponsored a naughty elephant called Esampu and danced around her kitchen to the Hamilton soundtrack.

Through all the years spent in various corners of the world, Rachael remained a loyal and diligent friend, sharing gossip, book recommendations and outrage at the state of the world from afar, then cramming in catch ups during stints back home. When she returned to the UK in 2020, to do a master's in Education and Development, we were thrilled to have her back. She was part way through that master's, getting distinctions in all her essays and preparing to start volunteering in a women's refuge, when she became ill. On the same day that she told her friends the devastating news about her brain tumour, she also urged us all to vote for the Women's Equality party in the mayoral election. There is only so much time for despondency when you are busy trying to make the world a better place.

Though Rachael was always deeply sceptical of the institution of marriage, she and Alun decided to have a civil partnership. She planned to have a big party to celebrate it in 2024 – and what a party it would have been. Even as her illness progressed, she remained the same optimistic, chatty and determined Rachael.



The doctors said she wouldn't get out of bed again; the next thing they knew, she was walking down the stairs of her flat and into the pub. A force of nature to the very end, she died at home, surrounded by as much love and support as she had given out over her unjustly short life. She didn't get to finish her master's, but the university has decided to award it to her posthumously.

It probably won't surprise you to know that Rachael was ambivalent about the idea of private education — especially after meeting so many people for whom accessing even basic education was a daily struggle. But the truth is, Rachael loved Kimbolton. She loved her friends, her classes, the school trips to America, Edinburgh, Dorset and Belgium, the opportunities, the ludicrously beautiful grounds. And thank goodness she came here, because it meant we were lucky enough to know her. There are not enough pages to do justice to all the things that Rachael did and all the things that she was, but I can say with confidence that she made everyone around her better and braver. I will forever feel lucky to have been able to call her my friend. In the months since she died, "Be More Rach" has become a mantra of which we remind each other often.

Some of Rachael's school friends, along with her family, planted an oak tree on the school grounds in her memory. If you are near the cross country route, just beyond the swimming pool, look out for a small oak sapling and remember a truly extraordinary woman.
